
From the Conductor

I am thrilled and humbled to step into my tenure as the Conductor and Music Director of the Temple Hill Symphony Orchestra. I love this organization, the people in it, and its mission of sharing the light of Christ, joy, hope, unity, and accessible music with the community. Former conductor Jay Trottier leaves a huge legacy. The beautiful relationships he's created with our instrumentalists and our community are powerful and meaningful, and we are honored to have him and his wife Becky in our lives.

When it came time to choose the music for my first concert with the symphony, the decision was easy—John Williams's music for *Star Wars*. I was eleven years old when I watched *Star Wars*: A *New Hope* for the first time, and not ten minutes after the movie ended, I had thrown together a costume from household items and was chasing my siblings around the house, using my mom's blow dryer as a blaster. From that moment on, I was a fan for life.

I spent many hours growing up listening to CDs of the soundtracks, marveling over John Williams's brilliant score. I've studied the pieces of music that inspired it-classic movie scores and epic symphonies. Through his use of leitmotifs (a musical phrase or melody associated with a character, theme, or idea), Williams is able to tell stories, build worlds, express conflicts, convey hope and yearning, and share triumph all through chords, harmonies, and melodic lines. Without his score, these movies would never have achieved the sort of lasting generational success they have.

Star Wars now unites my husband and I with our two daughters, and it's something we enjoy together as a family. For many, these films and their memorable musical themes bring generations together, conveying universal ideas of hope, inspiration, and goodness. I hope as you listen tonight that you share the joy of that connection with your family, found family, loved ones, friends, and neighbors. Thank you for being with us. May the Force be with you.

She has performed with the Temple Hill Symphony Orchestra in the Salute to Youth Concert and the Russian Classics Concert as a piano soloist. 

Program Notes

The Music of Star Wars

In 1975, George Lucas chose film composer John Williams to score his upcoming film, a fairy tale set in space that would be unlike anything anyone had seen on screen before. Because of this unusual setting, Lucas wanted a classical symphonic score, something that would feel familiar and comfortable to audiences, juxtaposing what they saw on screen. Williams was the perfect person for the job. Once George Lucas had put together a rough cut of the film, he added temporary music tracks so Williams could get a feel for what he wanted where. Lucas used Holst's "Mars" from *The Planets*, and you can hear its influence in the "Main Title." He used excerpts from classic film scores, like the music written by Erich Korngold, Max Steiner, and Miklós Rózsa in the 1930s and 40s. He used the beginning of the fourth movement of Dvořák's *New World Symphony* to convey moments of triumph. John Williams took that inspiration and created something iconic. He went on to score eight more *Star Wars* films.

Williams's score for *Star Wars: A New Hope* is still celebrated almost 50 years later for a reason. He uses themes, techniques, and structures seamlessly to make us feel something. He begins "Leia's Theme" with a major 6th interval, an interval commonly used to convey hopeful longing. He creates tension with a dueling melody between the woodwinds and brass in "Duel of the Fates" to illustrate the battle through music. He uses frantic rhythm patterns and unusual chords to convey the chaos of dodging danger in "The Asteroid Field." Every piece has something technically masterful that builds the story and transports us to a far away galaxy that somehow feels familiar at the same time. And that's the beauty of what John Williams does through his score. Without his soaring melodies, *Star Wars* would not be what it is today—an iconic part of our collective cultural identity.
